NMDC has undertaken research to seek data about the performance of leading museums around the world. This research will complement the research on UK National Museums being undertaken by Tony Travers of LSE for our *Valuing Museums* project. Research has found that few countries collect and publish information about performance to the same degree that UK national museums do. This is due to different reporting structures, different levels of accountability and to some extent different ideological understanding of museum performance. France

The Réunion de Musées Nationaux

Th Réunion de Musées Nationaux publishes annual reports, which can be downloaded from their website (www.rmn.fr). The most recent one covered the years 2000 and 2001. The Ministry of Culture has a Department of Studies and Futurology (EPD) which produces statistics on cultural activity. A summary of these, known as *Mini Chiffres Cles* (Mini Key Figures) are published on their website each year. The most recent figures cover 2001.

Netherlands

State funding of culture takes three forms: long-grange institutional subsidies, project subsidies and special-purpose grants. The main flow of funding is the long-range subsidies which are allocated every four years on the basis of a balanced consideration of subsidy applications from all the different sectors. These applications are submitted a year before the start of the next funding period. Subsidies are provided in the form of a block grant, so that institutions can reserve any operating surplus to use later for extra activities or to cover operating deficits, provided the operational budget balances out over the entire subsidy period. For example, an institution may choose to save up during the first two years of a subsidy period in order to undertake extra activities in the third year. As in the UK, the main ministerial and government responsibilities for museums relate to the management of the national collections. In the Netherlands, this is delegated to the semi-privatised national museums and overseen by the Cultural Heritage Inspectorate. The Netherlands Institute of Cultural Heritage (ICN) provides services and information to the entire museum sector.

The Ministry of Education, Culture and Science website gives details of funding for museums from 1984 to 1998 (in guilders) and from 1997-2001 in Euros.

The total budget for culture is approximately 1% of the national budget and has remained more or less stable for the past ten years. (source: Cultural Policy in the Netherlands, Ministry OcenW www.minocw.nl/english oud/cubeleid engels/h41.htm)

The table above shows that the museum budget has grown dramatically over the last 20 years. The state museums gained slightly more breathing space in 1989; previously they had been required to re-channel their income into the state purse, but from then on they could invest their revenues in their own operations. The budget was increased for several years from 1991 in order to implement the Delta Plan for the Preservation of the Netherlands Culture Heritage. As the backlogs in registering and conserving museum collections are resolved, these incidental funds will be decreased and the structural budgets increased. A third major shift in the museum budget took place in 1995, when the state museums were privatised and museum staffing costs were transferred to the budget. Finally, the museum budget was increased yet again in 1996 when the museums were made to pay rent on their premises for the first time.

Germany

The Institute Fur Museumkunde (IfM) undertakes research into a whole range of museum activities. There are two institutions in Germany which regularly collect data on museum personnel and on financing of museums. One is the statistical office of the city Stuttgart which for the "Deutscher Städtetag" undertakes a survey of museums in large towns every 4-6 years. museums, which is about nine percent of all German museums make up to nearly sixteen percent in the group of museums which is selected by the Deutscher Städtetag.

Deutscher Städtetag collects information on museum funding by municipalities. Together the municipalities (without the three towns Berlin, Hamburg, Bremen) in 1992 spent 8.477.644.000 DM (which means 4,4 percent of their whole budget) on cultural affairs. Of this 1,024,881,000 DM (12 %) was spent on museums, i.e. about 0.5% of the whole budget is spent on museums.

Another statistic from Deutscher Städtetag for 1992 which analyses answers from 1,739 museums, (83 % of all museums in that year's survey) gives some more information on the overall budgets of the museums. These 1,739 museums together spent 2,139,150,000 DM in 1992. 43 % of this amount was spent for staff, about 7 % for acquisition of objects. The statistic shows that the same museums earned about 27 % themselves, this means through entrance fees, selling publications or renting of rooms.
